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LUTHER COLLEGE STUDENTS AND THE CITY OF REGINA COLLABORATE ON STUDENT NET-ZERO PROJECTS

Students at Luther College at the University of Regina recently partnered with the City of Regina to expand their understanding of the City of Regina's important net-zero framework. These students learned about the City of Regina's Energy and Sustainability Framework and researched economic impacts of net-zero as part of their course work in PPE 400 – Philosophy, Politics and Economics.

At the beginning of the fall semester, the City of Regina shared a variety of topics for students to analyze. The students worked through the semester on their projects to tackle the real-life challenges the City of Regina faces. Last week, as the semester comes to an end, the students presented their ideas. The projects ranged from lowering vehicle emissions, to improving public transit to developing the green jobs workforce, just to name a few.

"It was exciting to see our students get a chance to work with a community partner on their capstone project," said Dr. Marc Jerry, Luther College President, and the professor of the PPE 400 course. "Any time you can give students hands-on experiential learning, the students benefit, but so do the organizations that we partner with -- it's a win-win."

One of the students in the course, Style Dayne Stenberg, agrees. "A hurdle upon graduation is applying what we learn in a classroom setting to the workforce. Hands on collaboration on projects are essential for bridging any gaps between the lecture hall and the boardroom. Having such a fantastic opportunity to be able to work one-on-one with stakeholders and potential employers empowers us to trust in ourselves and thrive."

"The City values this unique opportunity to facilitate civic engagement among youth while meaningfully collaborating with the University towards becoming a 100% renewable, net-zero city," said Faisal Kalim, the Director of Sustainability, Performance and Service Improvement at the City of Regina. "Involving this group of bright students in researching the economic, social, and environmental challenges and opportunities presented by our community energy transition, will contribute to more innovative solutions."
